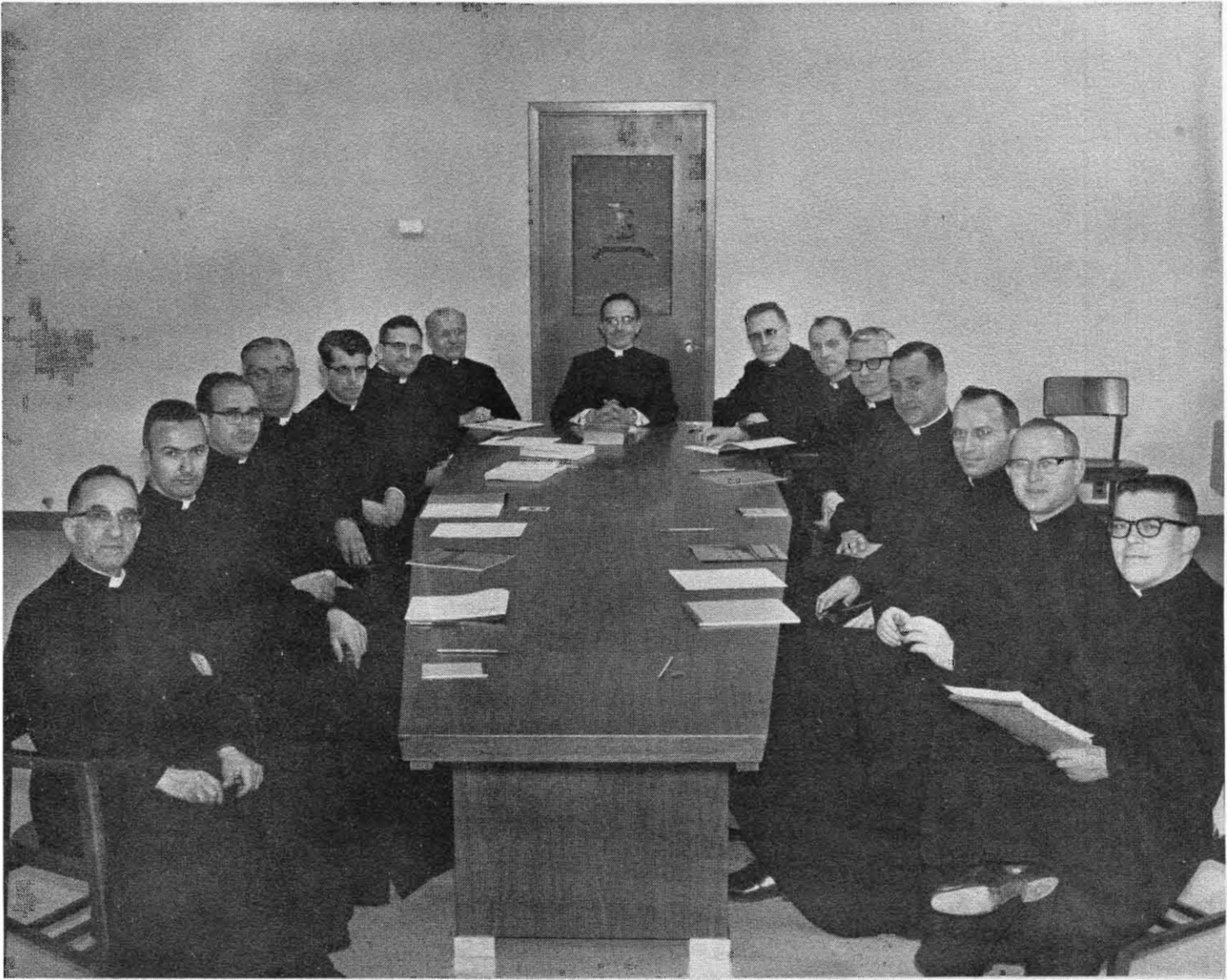

Two men, each named John, are for us now, and certainly will be for history, the magnificent figures of this school year and perhaps of our era. Death prevented both from fulfilling their great undertakings. Both of them gained their fullest stature in their deaths and by their deaths they advanced furthest the cause they both were so devoted to. To these two men, Pope John XXIII and President John Fitzgerald Kennedy, we dedicate this yearbook.

In a very real sense both men worked and died for the same cause, the brotherhood of man. Pope John sought the brotherhood of man under the Fatherhood of God, which he seemed a benevolent symbol of. He convened Vatican II that all men might be made more aware of God's Fatherhood and consequently more aware of our fundamental brotherhood with all men. But brotherhood for Pope John had to be more than well wishing; it had to mean the reunion of the Christian family, it had to be love of brother that erupts into social justice and charity toward the whole human community. This was the power of *Mater et Magistra*, *Pacem in Terris* and Vatican II.

President John F. Kennedy also dedicated his life to man's brotherhood. By being both a great President and an outstanding Catholic he replaced prejudice with understanding and good will. His was a mind that saw beyond self-interest, even national self-interest; a mind that believed in, and fought for, the human rights and liberty of men everywhere. He sought equal opportunity and justice for all men, not only Americans, and he was committed to the brotherhood of men "knowing that here on earth God's work must be our own."

These two men named John have shaped this year and the future. It is ours to continue so splendid a beginning, and it is indeed an awesome responsibility... "but let us begin."

A *Blue Devil* team which played well and will be far wiser in the future.



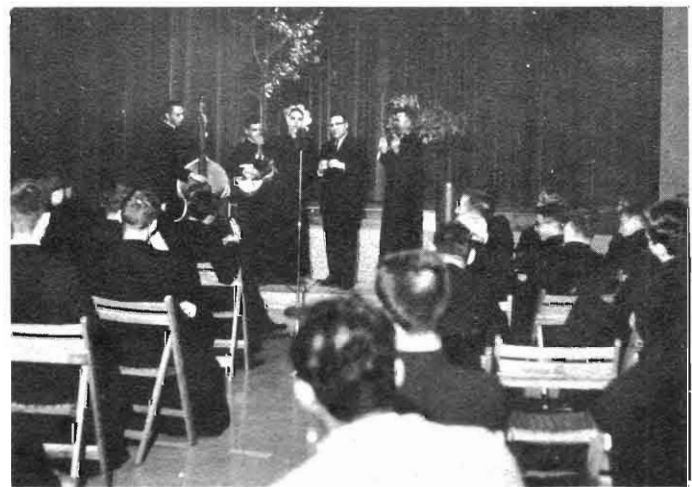
How the West won! Combining the crushing blocking he received from his teammates with his flashy play, QB Senior Mike Fisher led the "Golden Bears" to victory.



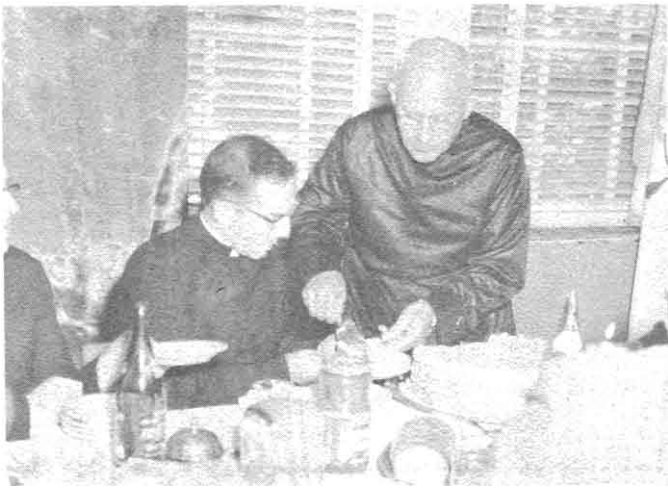

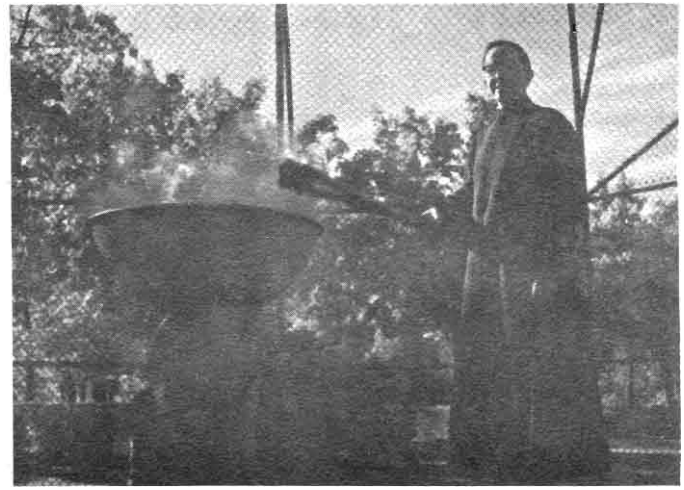

In the 100 yd. dash Frosh sprinter Bill Jaso streaked across the finish line in 10.4 setting a new College record.



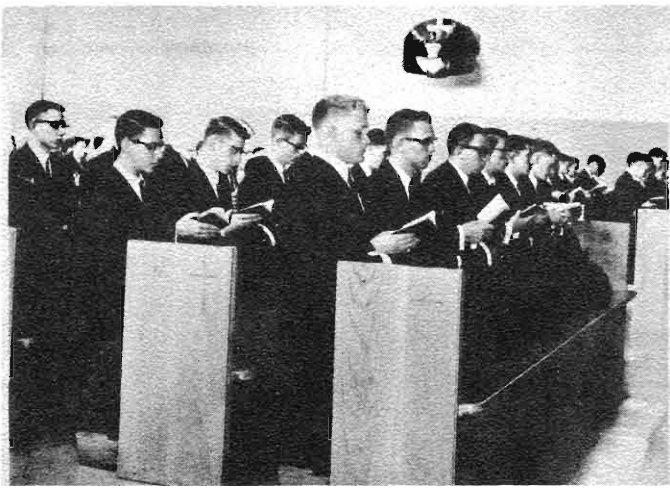
Leading the mile Junior Ken Roberts tried vainly to hold on to his title and to hold off victorious Frosh miler John Raso.



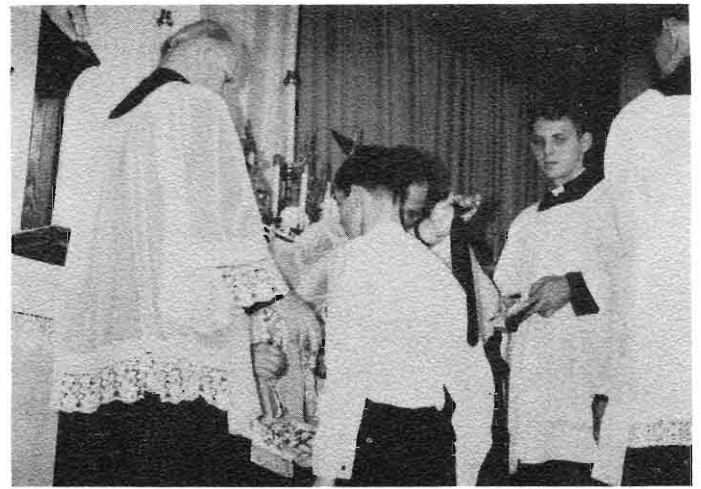
October under the flag of the New Jersey Tercentenary Fr. Dean and Fr. Director flank Dr. Richard McCormick, History professor from Rutgers University.

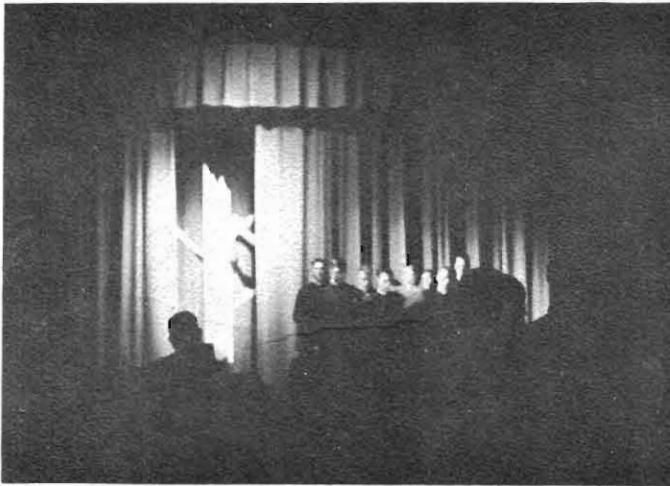

After the singing everyone made themselves at home with some coffee, cookies, and lots of pleasant conversation.



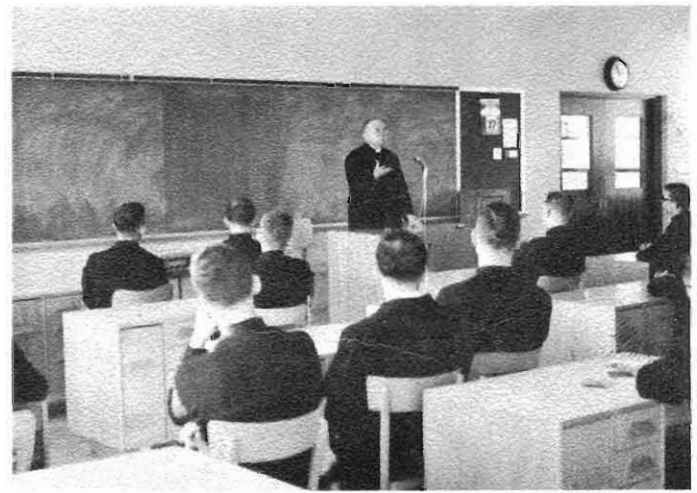

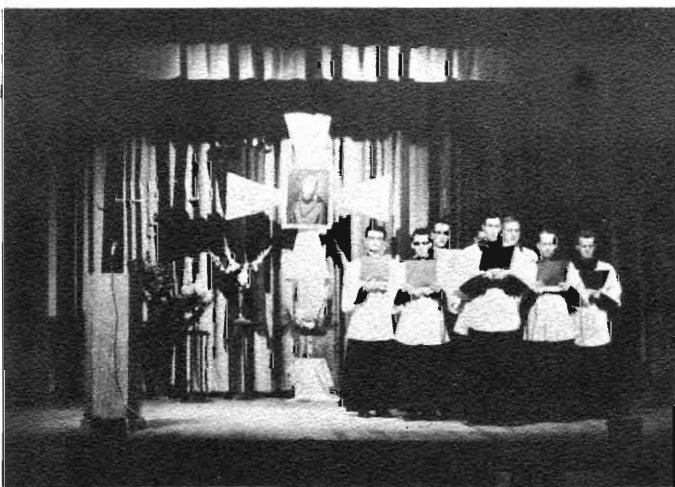

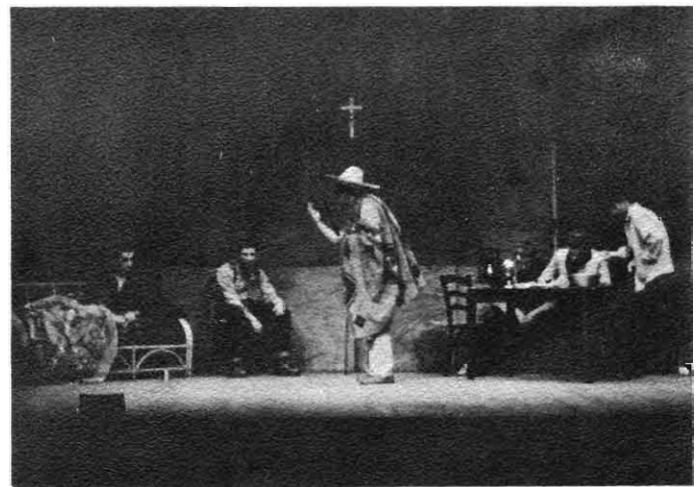

Later that evening the heroes of the Alamo were portrayed in the one-act play *God in Texas* performed by the Novices.



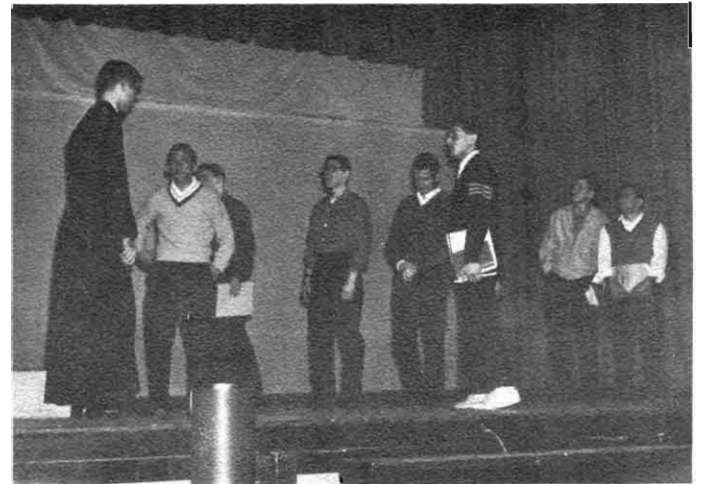

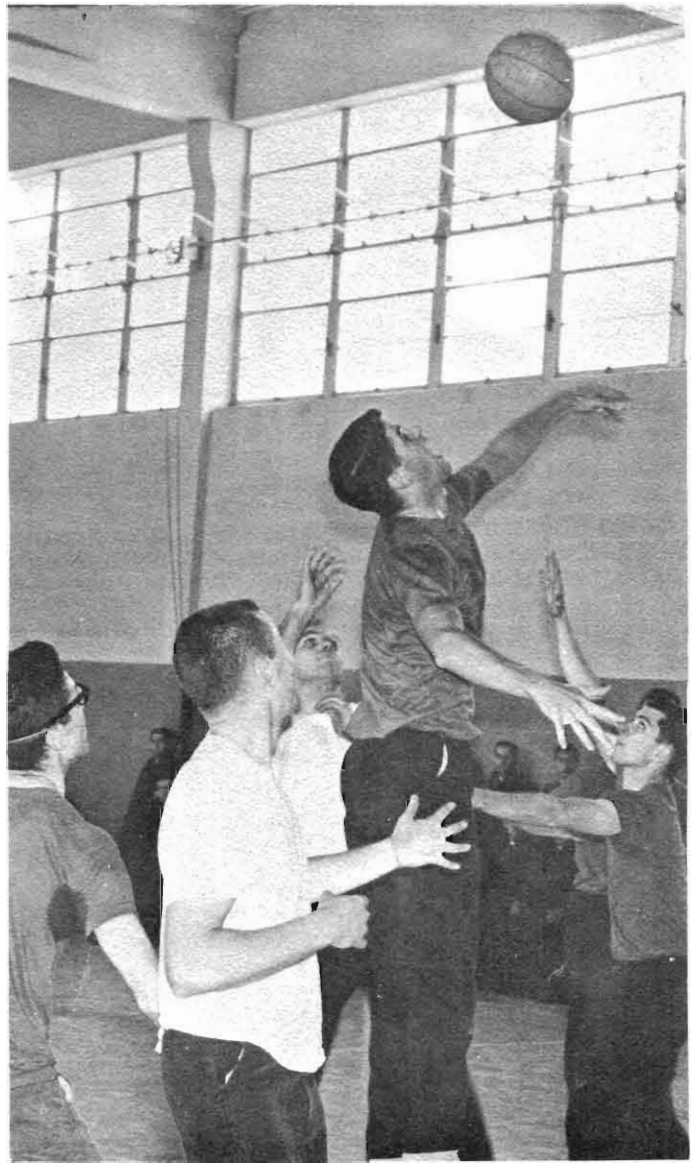
Fr. Henry smiled approvingly, as did all the Brothers, when Fr. Director officially inaugurated the 1964 National Catholic Book Week.

Mr. Douglas Hyde, internationally known lecturer and convert from Communism, spoke to the student body on Red Leadership techniques on March 16th.



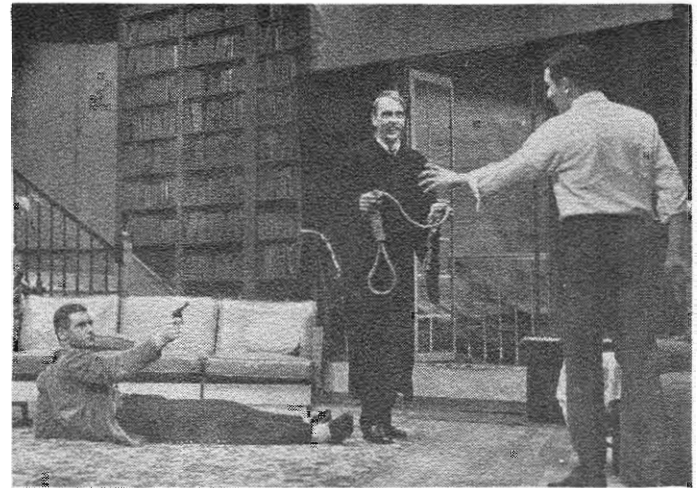
Pete McClemon and Marty Kilgallen serenaded Fr. Director on his feast day March 19.

The first act of Agatha Christie's *Ten Little Indians* presented on March 19th ended with this tension-packed scene.



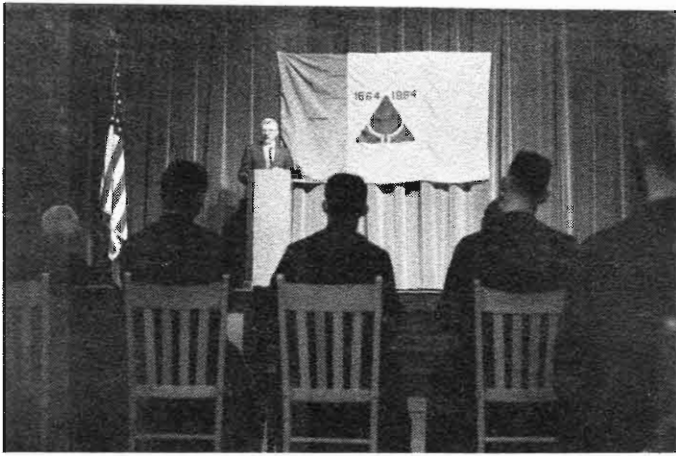
The mystery was solved in the final scene when the maniac, Judge Wargrave, returned from the dead to finish his rhyme.

The happy faces of the aspirants as they enjoyed Aspirants' Day testify to the youthful vigor of our province.



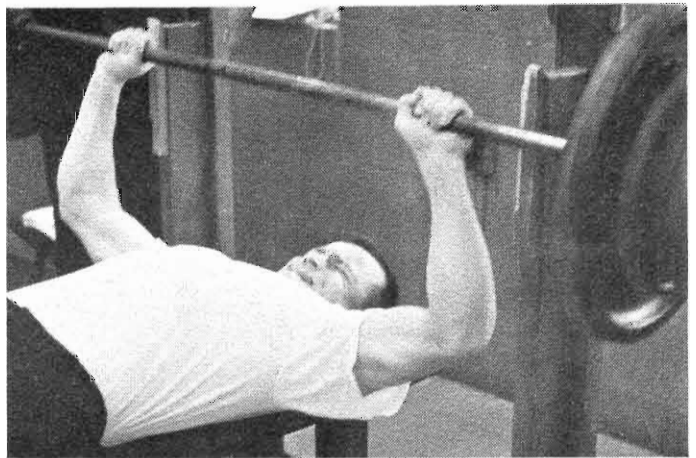
Dr. Arthur S. Link, Ph.D., Professor of History and editor of the Papers of Woodrow Wilson from Princeton University lectured at the college on April 15.



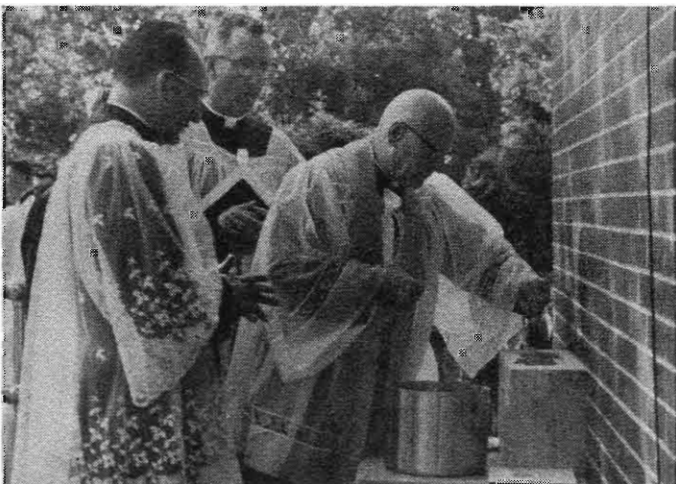
Mr. Harold Dugan, representing the parents, addressed the assemblage on Parents' Day on April 26.

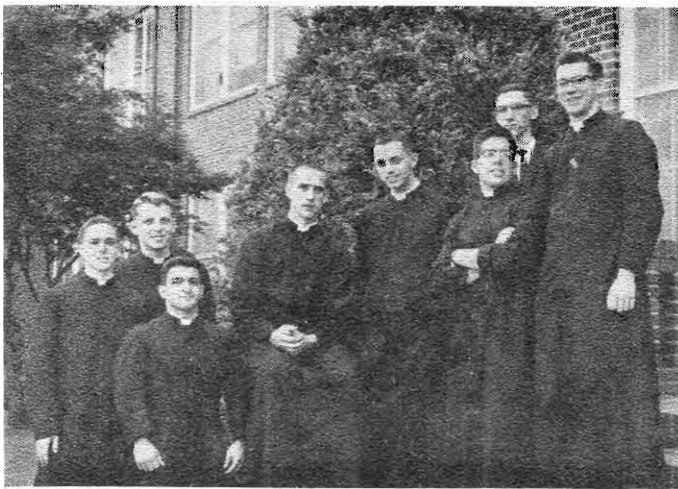

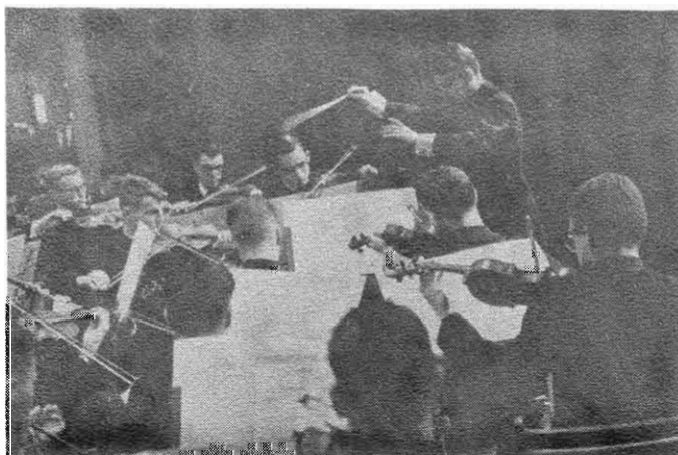

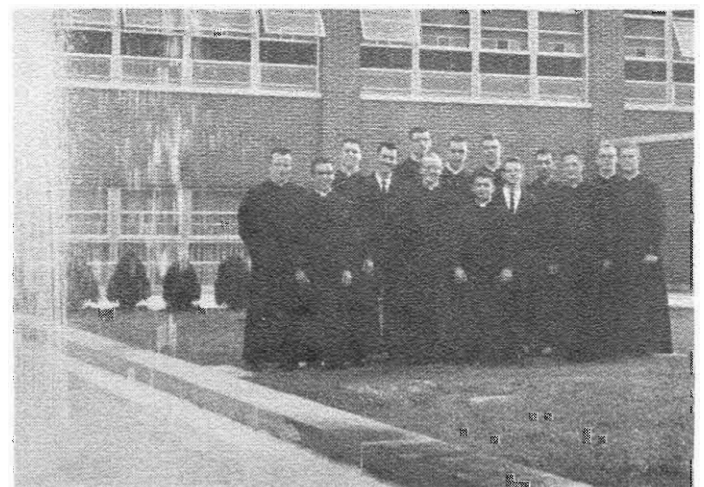
